Information Open House March 18 for Improvements to Highway 12 near Niobrara

The Nebraska Department of Roads will hold an Information Open House on Thursday, March 18, regarding reconstruction and resurfacing along several segments of Nebraska Highway 12 near Niobrara. The open house will be held from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m., at the WFLA Hall, Spruce and Park Avenue, in Niobrara.

The proposed project in Knox County involves constructing almost 11 miles of new two-lane roadway just south of the existing highway. The highway grade will be raised to reduce flood and backwater damage to the road.

The first segment of reconstruction begins just east of the Verdel turnoff and ends at Medicine Creek west of Niobrara. The second segment of reconstruction begins just east of Niobrara and ends at the Santee Sioux Indian Reservation.

Construction will include grading, surfacing, culverts, bridges and county road intersections. The completed highway will have shoulders, of which two feet will be surfaced.

Roadside construction for channel stabilization is proposed for a segment of highway west of Niobrara, between the Morman Canal and the Niobrara River. About 1-½ miles of Nebraska 12 will be resurfaced on the reservation, beginning where the reconstruction project ends and ending at the community of Santee.

The project will be constructed under traffic. Traffic will be routed on temporary roadways around work zones during some phases of construction.

Private property must be acquired for highway right-of-way in the areas where the driving lanes and roadsides will be reconstructed. Construction will impact wetland areas and mitigation will be required. Replacement wetlands will be established along the project or at a wetlands mitigation banksite.

Personnel from the Department of Roads will be available to visit one-on-one about the project. Displays will be available for public inspection, and NDOR personnel will receive comments and questions. No formal presentation is planned.

Preliminary plans developed by the Nebraska Department of Roads are available for public inspection at the NDOR District 3 Office, 408 N. 13th Street, in Norfolk, and at the Roadway Design Division, 1500 Highway 2, in Lincoln.

Work Scheduled To Begin On Highways 8 & 112

Work is scheduled to begin at two locations on Highway 8 and one on Highway 112 according to the Nebraska Department of Roads. Work on the Odell East & West project will begin on March 29 from the N-112 junction to the Gage/Jefferson County line. Work on the Liberty Spur – East project will begin April 5 from Spur S-34A to the N-8 and N-99 junction. The Odell Southwest project is located from the N-8 junction south to the State Line on Highway 112 and will begin later this year.

Constructors Inc. of Lincoln has the \$3,989,062 contracts for bridges, culverts, patching, milling and asphalt overlays.

Work will begin on the bridges located east and west of Odell beginning March 29. Local traffic accessing Odell will be routed on Highway 8 west of Odell and will have access into Odell via a shoofly on the west edge of Odell. Through traffic on Highway 8 will be detoured via N-112, US-136 and N-103. The bridges are scheduled to be re-opened August 14 to normal 2-lane – 2-way traffic. The remaining milling and asphalt overlay will be constructed under traffic with flaggers and pilot vehicles.

The Liberty Spur – East project will be constructed under traffic with flaggers and pilot vehicles. A box culvert located approximately 2 miles west of the N-8 and N-99 junction will be constructed in phases to facilitate one lane traffic at this location. There will be a restriction on overwidth traffic for this project.

The Odell Southwest project will be constructed under traffic with flaggers and pilot vehicles.

Motorists should watch for reduced speed limits in work zones and construction vehicles entering and leaving the highway. The public is also reminded that fines are doubled for speeding in work zones.

Work is anticipated to be completed in November. The project manager for these projects is Mike Habegger at the Tecumseh office.

NEBRASKA DEPARTMENT OF ROADS WINS 2003 PERPETUAL PAVEMENT AWARD

The Asphalt Pavement Alliance (APA) announced today that the State of Nebraska Department of Roads has won a 2003 Perpetual Pavement Award for a section of US Highway 20. The award was presented at a special ceremony at the APA's Asphalt Pavement Conference: 21st Century Construction during the World of Asphalt[®] 2004 Show and Conference, March 15-18, 2004, in Nashville.

To qualify for this prestigious award, a pavement must meet strict criteria and demonstrate Hot Mix Asphalt's long-life characteristics, excellence in design, quality in construction, and value to the traveling public. It also must have been constructed at least 35 years ago. Engineers at the National Center for Asphalt Technology (NCAT) evaluated the nominations and a panel of industry experts validated the winners.

"The long-term performance of this segment of US-20, near O'Neill, Nebraska, is an excellent example of one of the many benefits the citizens of Nebraska enjoy when design, construction, and maintenance all come together," commented John Jacobsen, Deputy Director-Operations, of the State of Nebraska Department of Roads. "When the right mix is placed by conscientious construction personnel and maintained by a dedicated, state-maintenance force, the service life of roads can extend to 30 or more years. The knowledge we gained from the long-term performance of US-20, along with similar roads, is one reason why we have developed and are aggressively pursuing the Department's preventive maintenance program."

The award-winning pavement runs from reference post 309.02 to 314.71 on US 20 in Holt County, traveling along the terraces of the Elkhorn River. The climate in the area is wet/freeze.

The road was made from gravel before 1938, when it was graded and surfaced with a bituminous mat (cold mix asphalt). It received a second bituminous mat in 1947, and a double armor coat in 1955.

The first Hot Mix Asphalt surface—a 3-inch course sand/gravel HMA with high oil content—was placed in 1967 on top of a 4-inch granular base and the existing 5-inch bituminous mat. The road received another 3-inch HMA overlay in 1982. In 1998, 2 inches of the asphalt were removed by cold milling and then replaced by a 2-inch layer of HMA.

The state has maintained the road with spot patching and sealing throughout the years as necessary. "There was nothing out of the ordinary in the construction of the road; its long life, I believe, is due to a good preventive maintenance program," said Mark Kovar, District Engineer for the Nebraska DOR. He notes that the road has held up well despite the increasing number of motor vehicles: the average daily traffic is now 2,970 vehicles a day, with trucks making up 13 percent of that number.

"Even though this pavement has been punished by more than 35 years of heavy use, motorists are still using the original pavement structure," said Pete Alex, APA Co-Chairman. "The extraordinary performance of this pavement is worthy of attention."

"Perpetual Pavement is an industry standard which is extremely well represented by this highway," added Luke Stango, APA Co-Chairman. "Long life, durability, and exceptional performance are hallmarks of Hot Mix Asphalt. This pavement is testimony to high-performance asphalt as a marriage of excellent design and quality construction."

Public Hearing March 30 for South Omaha Veterans Memorial Bridge Study

The Nebraska Department of Roads will hold a Public Hearing Tuesday, March 30, to present results of a study to replace the Veterans Memorial Bridge over the Missouri River between Omaha and Council Bluffs, Iowa. The hearing will be held from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., at Sokol South Omaha, 2021 U Street, in Omaha.

Nebraska is the lead agency, in coordination with the Iowa Department of Transportation, for the study about replacing the two-lane historic bridge. The preferred alignment for a new four-lane structure is just north of the existing bridge. The intersection of 13th Street and Missouri Avenue must be reconstructed as part of the project.

Acquisition of private property will be required to construct the project. Possible acquisitions include two businesses, six residences along Missouri Avenue, and six residences on the east side of 13th Street. The department's Relocation Assistance Program will be available.

Bridge replacement will impact wetland areas, mostly on the lowa side of the river. Replacement wetlands for about three acres will be established at a mitigation site.

Much of the new bridge will be constructed while traffic is maintained on the existing bridge. U.S.275 over the Missouri River must be closed for four to six months to complete construction, and traffic will be detoured along Interstate 80 via South 13th Street in Omaha and South 24th Street in Council Bluffs.

A Draft Environmental Impact Statement about the project was approved by the Federal Highway Administration on Jan. 22, 2004. It is available for public review and comment at the Council Bluffs Public Library at 400 Willow Ave., the Omaha Public Library at 2302 M St., the NDOR District 2 Headquarters at 4425 S. 108 St. in Omaha, the NDOR Central Headquarters at 1500 Hwy 2 in Lincoln, the Nebraska Division Office of the Federal Highway Administration at 100 Centennial Mall North in Lincoln, the Iowa DOT Office at 300 West Broadway at 4th Street in Council Bluffs, and the Iowa DOT District 4 Office at 63200 White Pole Road in Atlantic. Copies of the document also will be available at the March 30 forum.

The public meeting is being held to present information and to receive comments and questions. No formal presentation is planned. An English and Spanish language translator will be available. Written statements and exhibits will be accepted as part of the public record for ten days.

Officials from the city of Omaha plan to hold a public meeting in conjunction with the bridge meeting to present information about the city's proposed Gibson Road Viaduct project just south of the bridge.


